There passed peacefully away at her home, Colville Road, on the morning of February 19th, 1923, Mrs. John Docherty (nee Mary Anne Weatherbie) after an illness of about four months, borne with Christian patience, hope and fortitude, passed within the veil, her husband having predeceased her some eight years ago. Mrs. Docherty was in her 68th year. As a faithful, kind and loving mother, she could not be surpassed. She was unselfish, untiring and industrious in her efforts to make her home a place of happiness and bliss. But her influence could not be confined there, for it found an outlet wherever there was sickness or help needed. She was ever ready and willing to do her part cheerfully. Mrs. Docherty was the eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Weatherbie, of Ocean View, P. E. Island. She leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother, five sons and two daughters: Daniel and John, of Kingston; Kenneth, of New Haven; Mrs. John M. McPhee, of Riverdale; Sadie and George at home; also three brothers and two sisters: John Weatherbie, of Ocean View, P.E.I.; William H. of Olympia; George D., of Vancouver, B.C. There was also another brother, Malcolm J., of Olympia, who predeceased her some thirteen years ago. The sisters are Mrs. Murdoch Buchanan, of Boston, Mass., and Mrs. Ronald MacLellan, of Glace Bay, C.B. The large funeral, which took place from her home to Clyde River Presbyterian cemetery, on Wednesday afternoon, February 21, evidenced the fact that she was held in high esteem in the community, there being over ninety sleighs in the procession. The funeral service was conducted at the house and grave by the Rev. M. J. McPherson, of Hampton, who also visited her during her illness. On Monday, January 31st, Mrs. Neil Campbell, a very highly esteemed resident of Clyde River, passed peacefully away at her home at the age of seventy-four years. The deceased had not been in good health for some months so that the coming of the end was not altogether unexpected, although naturally of quite a strong constitution the continued illness gradually wore her strength away until on the above mentioned date her gentle spirit winged its homeward flight.

Besides a sorrowing husband Mrs. Campbell leaves to mourn their great loss five sons and a grand-daughter, Miss Catherine Campbell who ever since her mother, Mrs. John Campbell, died, when she was quite young, has made her home with her grandmother.

The five sons are: John A. Campbell of Wallaston, Mass., father of Miss Catherine Campbell referred to above; Charles Campbell and W. F. Campbell, Quincy, Mass.; Harry Campbell, Elmwood and Beecher Campbell at home.

Mr. Campbell and his sons and grand daughter are all feeling their loss very keenly.

Mrs. Campbell whose maiden name was Miss Mary Docherty was one of a family of four members. Of these only one survives the deceased, namely; Mrs. John Buchanan, Pinette Bridge. The other two John Docherty, New Haven, and Mrs. Annie Campbell, Milton, P. E. I., died some years ago.

Mrs. Campbell was a lady who will be much missed by all who had the pleasure of knowing her. She took a great interest in all that pertained to the best interests of the community.

For quite a number of years she was a loyal member of the Presbyterian Church at Clyde River and was always ready to help on with the work in every way possible.

In coming through the recent crisis she and her family stood firmly by the church of their fathers.

In times of sickness and of sorrow in the community in her days of good health, Mrs. Campbell was to all in need as an angel of mercy. To her home all worthy comers always received a hearty welcome, and no one needing aid ever called upon her in vain.

But while her many friends and acquaintances will miss her kindly and genial personality, it is in the home that her loss will be most keenly felt. There her presence was always a benediction. Her loved ones will often sigh but in vain for the touch of a vanished hand and long but to no avail for the sound of a voice that is still. When the end came she was calm and unmoved. She knew in "whom she had believed and she was persuaded that He was able to keep what she had committed to His trust against that day." Her passing was one of sweet peace.

The funeral which was a very large one was held on the afternoon of Thursday, February 3rd. In the funeral procession there were some ninety sleighs. In the unavoidable absence of her pastor, Rev. R. H. Stavert, the service was conducted by Rev. M. Scott Fulton, assisted by Rev. E. M. Aitken.

The pallbearers were Messrs Daniel T. Fraser, Cornelius Cahill, Nicholas Colwell, Malcolm Buchanan, Joseph Gallant and Samuel Clow.

Interment was in the Presbyterian Cemetery at Clyde River.

The death of John Docherty occurred at his home, New Haven, on Tuesday Dec. 29th, at the age of 71 years. The deceased had been in failing health for some time and on Monday suffered a stroke of paralysis. The late Mr. Docherty was very kind hearted and obliging man, upright in all his dealings, and well held in high esteem by a wide circle of friends. He leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving husband and father, a sorrowing widow, five sons Daniel, Kenneth, Alexander, John and George, and two daughters Sarah and Annie May, all New Haven. Three sisters, Mrs. Campbell, New Haven, Mrs. Buchanan, Belfast, and Mrs. only Buchanan, Elmwood, survive him. The funeral service, Wed. Dec. 30th, conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. H. McHattie, was very largely attended, many friends from far and near following the remains to their last resting place in the Presbyterian cemetery, Clyde River.
