John Lawrence⁽³⁵⁾. They were known to be

a very close family.

Annie⁽²⁵⁾ was born on April 10, 1847,
and died at an early age just before
her child was to be born. It was unable
to find her husband's name or further
information.

Jane⁽²⁷⁾ was adopted by Donald and
Margaret. She died July 27, 1938 and is
buried in the Clyde River Cemetery. She
was married to Anthony Buchanan⁽³⁸⁾,
who died August 16, 1938, and buried in
Clyde River Cemetery. They had children
and lived in Einnacod near the

Dooherty (horrostrach) Jane, I have been told, was an extremely caring sister, and that when John⁽³⁵⁾, my great grandfather, was in the fields working near her home she was always bringing him refreshments.

Mary⁽³⁵⁾ was born in 1851, and died in 1927. She was married to Neil Campbell⁽³⁶⁾, who was born in 1853 dying in 1940.

They lived in the United States for a large part of their lives, and had five very successful children. I have been told that Mary was noted for being a perfectionist about herself and home, and demanding complete rest on Sundays.

Sarah Docherty⁽³¹⁾ was born
March 10, 1850, and died in 1938. She
married John Buchanan⁽³²⁾, and they

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John Laurence Docherty⁽³³⁾, my great-grandfather, was born on December 25, 1845, and died December 28, 1914. He married Mary Ann Weather⁽³⁴⁾ of Ocean View, who was born in 1856 and died February 19, 1923. They were buried in the Clyde River Cemetery. They were married on February 23, 1880, and had seven children. John was the only son of Donald⁽²²⁾ and Margaret⁽²³⁾, and remained on the Homestead. A lot of family history was passed on through Mary Ann, due to her love of story telling. She passed peacefully away at her home on the Colville Road on the morning of February 19, 1923, Mrs. John Docherty, (nee Mary Ann Weatherbie) after a short illness of about four months. Born with Christian patience, hope, and fortitude passed within the veil, her husband having predeceased her some eight years ago. Mrs. Docherty was in her sixty-eighth

years. As a faithful, kind and loving mother she could not be surpassed, she was unselfish, untiring and industrious in her efforts to make her home a place of happiness and bliss.

But her influence could not be confined there for it found an outlet wherever there was sickness or help needed, she was ever ready and willing to do her part. Mrs. Decherty was the eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Weather of Ocean View, P. E. I. She leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving mother, five sons and two daughters; Daniel and John of Kingston; Kenneth of New Haven; Mrs. John M. MacPhee of Riverdale and Alexander, Jack, and George at home,

also three brothers and two sisters; John J. Weatherbis of Ocean View, William H. Weatherbis of Olympia; George D. Weatherbis of Vancouver, B. C.; also another brother Malcolm J. Weatherbis of Olympia who predeceased her some thirteen years ago. The sisters are Mrs. Murdoch Buchanan of Boston, Mass.; and Mrs. Ronald MacKenzie of Glace Bay, Cape Breton. The large funeral which took place from her home to Clyde River Presbyterian Cemetery on Wednesday afternoon, February 21st evidenced the fact that she was held in high esteem in the community. There being over ninety sleighs in the procession. The funeral services were conducted at the house and grave by Rev. M. J. McPherson of Hampton

who also visited her during her illness.

The pallbearers were Malcolm Buchanan, Nicholas Colwell, Joseph Gallant, Cornelius Cahill, Angus McPhee, and Duncan McElvany.

It is with regret that we chronicle the death of Mr. John Docherty, New Haven, P.E.I., who passed away on December 28, 1914 in his sixty-ninth year. He was the only son of the late Donald Docherty.

Mr. John Docherty was stricken with paralysis a few years ago and although he had been in delicate health he was always inquiring about the many duties requiring his attention on the farm and under his guiding hands a

system of order and neatness was everywhere observable. The deceased was a man of sterling worth, an affectionate husband and father, a kind brother, and a good neighbour. Of a cheerful, generous, kindly spirit, he possessed the rare faculty of being able to cover the failings of others with the mantle of charity, and was ever delighted to lend a helping hand to anyone in need. His place in the community will indeed be hard to fill. He will be greatly missed in his home, by his sorrowing widow, who mourns the loss of a devoted husband.
