ANCESTOR'S SERVICES

My ancestor's services in assisting in the establishment of American Independence during the War of the Revolution were as follows:

Morgan Hammond was the son of Amariah Hammond & Catherine Krueger. Catherine Krueger born Nov 20 1776 daughter of General Daniel Krueger. (by his first wife. General Krueger married Amariah's mother for his second wife). They died in the service.

Both of Morgan Hammond's grandfathers were in the Revolution. Captain John Hammond & General Daniel Krueger. Morgan Hammond's uncles in the Revolution were Lieutenant Lebbens Tubbs - Captain Bidley's Company in the Wyoming Valley, and for many years. (2) Captain Josiah Hammond - Captain 3rd Battalion (3) Lebbens Hammond. Much has been written about the history of the Wyoming Valley - also books "Wyoming", "Miners Wyoming", "Chapman's Frankfort Bath, a Tale of Wyoming", "Life of James J. Moser", "Van Campen" and a number of other historical works treating on the early history of the Wyoming valley. It is said that he was

ANCESTOR'S SERVICES

My ancestor's services in assisting in the establishment of American Independence during the War of the Revolution were as follows:

Andrew Gray was a resident of Buffalo Valley on the West Branch of the Susquehanna River in Northumberland County Pennsylvania. He enlisted in the Spring of 1776, serving as a private in Captain Wertzel's Company, Colonel Miller's Pennsylvania Rifle Regiment. He was at the Battle of Long Island when he was captured by the Hessians and held a prisoner until sometime in the following spring when he was exchanged. He joined Captain Barker's Company, Colonel Walter Stewart's Pennsylvania Regiment. He was at the Battle of Monmouth & was discharged in June 1780. He was allowed pension on account of said service. Andrew Gray was married in May 1791 and lived in Wilkes-Barre, Pa. for four years & then moved to Sparta, New York. His widow was allowed pension on her application executed June 20, 1845. While living in Sparta New York. She died April 10th 1847.
